

We were delighted to finally get out to our edible garden planters. We have been preparing the soil in readiness for transplanting our seedlings.









Our new religion topic has got us thinking about the power and energy of the Holy Spirit. We have been talking about how fire and wind can be used to make things work and also how destructive these can also be. We then used 'Word Art' to create these wind and fire word collages. We filled them with the ideas that we had gathered, about what wind and fire sound like, smell like. look like, feel like and what they can be used for.



We have also written scripts, between a news reporter and one of the Apostles, in response to 'The Ascension' (based on Acts 1:6-11). We reflected on how the Apostles felt during this time and what Jesus wanted them to do as His witnesses.
